ST HUGH'S SUMMER LUNCHBOX SCHEME - We have now completed the Summer Lunchbox Scheme, providing weekly breakfast and lunch supplies to families in Baildon who need help over the school summer holidays. The cost of living crisis has affected food prices and this negatively impacts families who rely on free school meal places in term time. We provided the service to 23 families with 52 children for all 6 weeks of the holidays. In total we supplied 3120 meals! The total cost of the scheme was £2438.38 which was funded by the WISHH Partnership, the Church School's SOAR Council who ran a raffle in Lent and raised £600. The Butterfield Trust and we received donations from Burbank Market (thanks to James Farrell) and other individuals who brought us loaves of bread and boxes of cereal. Special thanks to Anthea Petts who sacrificed her summer to shopping, packing and distributing – she has worn herself out and now I am taking a holiday and leaving her to run the food bank – sorry Anthea! Also thanks to Lucy Woodhead who helped us every week. The Lunchbox scheme has finished but the food bank takes over, supporting local people who can't afford to feed themselves or their families. Please continue supporting us by leaving donations in the food bank boxes outside St John's, St James's and by the tills in Baildon Co-op. Thanks and best wishes, Sarah Baxter
